Joint Injections

Workshop Overview:

The purpose of this workshop will be to understand the role of joint injections to help address common musculoskeletal problems in primary care. The review will cover the indications for injections around the knee, shoulder, elbow, foot and ankle. There will also be a review of the anatomy and approaches for knee and shoulder joint injections. Learning will be enhanced by computer slide presentation and hands on laboratory experience.

Upon completion of the workshop, participants will:

1. Evaluate the purpose for joint injections and aspiration.
2. Compare musculoskeletal injections by joint site, steroid agent and dosage.
3. Identify potential side effects.
4. Counsel patients.
5. Assess the benefits of adding musculoskeletal to practice.

Thursday, March 9

Assessment of the Lumbar Spine and Sacroiliac Joint

Workshop Overview:

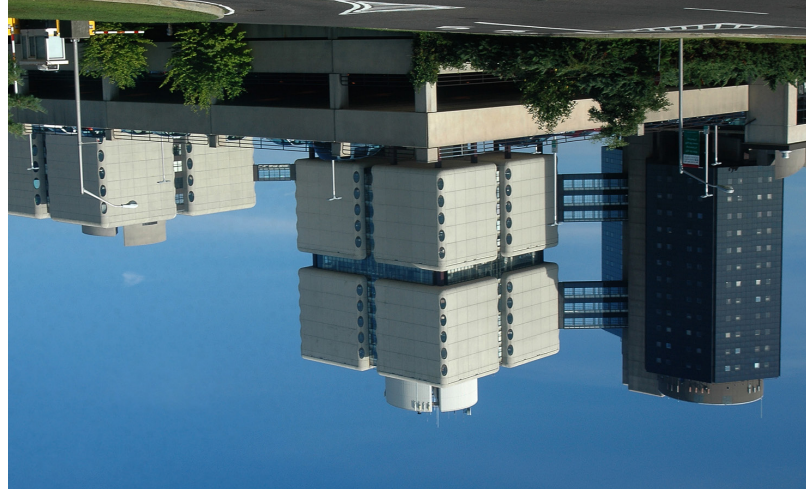
The purpose of this workshop is to learn how to systemically assess the patient for lumbar and sacroiliac spine dysfunction. The course will review relevant anatomy as it relates to low back pain. Participants will learn to properly evaluate some of the most common sources of low back pain, including nerve root compression, spinal segmental instability, myofascial pain syndromes and chronic degenerative changes of the lumbar spine. Learning will be enhanced with computer slide presentation and hands on laboratory experience.

Upon completion of the workshop, participants will be able to:

1. Identify and discuss relevant anatomical and biomechanical concerns as they relate to the examination of the lumbar spine and sacroiliac joint.
2. Evaluate specific mobility of the lumbar spine, sacroiliac joint.
3. Develop palpation and observational skills to identify dysfunctions in the lumbar spine and sacroiliac joint.
4. Apply appropriate special tests to determine the proper diagnosis.
5. Interpret exam findings to establish an accurate diagnosis.
6. Appropriately manage patients with chronic low back pain.

GENERAL EDUCATIONAL OBJECTIVES for the Family Medicine Update

The rapid advances in diagnosis and treatment makes continuing updating important for the family physician. This three-day course is designed to cover current and common areas of clinical practice, including integrated topics in: cardiovascular disease, endocrinology, gastroenterology, geriatrics, infectious disease, integrative medicine, musculoskeletal disease, neurology, ophthalmology, pediatrics, psychiatry, radiology, rheumatology, telemedicine and urology. A half-day of concurrent sessions includes hands-on clinical skills in emergency management. Evening workshops include practical sessions on lumbar spine and sacroiliac joint evaluation and treatment, and on joint injection.

Upon completion of the program, participants should be able to:

- Diagnose and clinically manage problems frequently encountered in family practice.
- Use and interpret currently available diagnostic techniques.
- Appropriately apply and select from among currently available therapeutic modalities.
- Apply skills in problem-solving, including eliciting pertinent history, performing physical examination, gathering and evaluating diagnostic data, making clinical decisions, implementing therapy and providing continuous care.
- Perform appropriate preventive procedures and patient counseling to promote and maintain health and prevent disease.
- Identify problems failing to respond to management as an anticipated and necessitating consultation to confirm the diagnosis and/or plan management, as well as those conditions requiring referral for definitive care.
